#### Editorial

"Please to remember the fifth of November..." Yes, what with Bonfire Night and Remembrance Day and Remembrance Sunday, this is a time for remembering. It could be argued that with so much information readily available at our fingertips via the web or in countless reference books, that there is less need to remember anything that can be 'looked up'. Certainly older readers will have had much more to commit to memory at school: dates of historical events, or lists, tables and formulae, passages of scripture and poetry... and these stay with you better than what happened yesterday!

With the huge volume of historical information to hand, so many documentary programmes about past events, so much concentration on anniversaries, especially of national or international tragedies, is there ever a danger that too much looking back raises unpleasant memories better forgotten? Is there a case to be made for forgetting? Certainly it's a good idea to read more than one account of historical events from different viewpoints if we really want to learn truths. Mind you, that's also true of today's events. Better still to read reports of people who were there, real-life witnesses.


There might be a danger now that with so much communication being brief and quick- and for that matter easily lost or deleted- and not kept in hard copy form that today's events, and observations about them, might get lost. Yes, we store more pictures than ever, but those alone, and because they can be doctored, may not give the whole story.

The other aspect of memory and looking back is the great growth in studying our ancestry, made so much easier by computer records. We get fascinated by who we are, where we came from, who we are related to, who else there was around at the time. What these records do not have are details of lifestyle, what it was like living then, the pastimes, the joys, the hardships, the squabbles, the local responses to national or international events. We've to look elsewhere for these, and thanks to those who wrote letters, kept diaries and logs, or account books, or copies of deeds and wills ,(or old newsletters!) we are enabled to get a fuller picture.

Where's this leading? Two ways: the first, let's look back remembering what is good for teaching us lessons for today, and forgetting what only hinders; and second, let's keep records now, personal reflections, events witnessed, conversations held, characteristic sayings of relations and friends, so that future generations will have the truest possible picture of life today; it's the details that are so revealing - and, children and young people, get your grandparents and great aunts and uncles to talk now about the past before it's too late, or rather should we say, listen to them when they do which is quite often! So write things down, better still record them talking! You'll never regret it! Even start keeping a diary yourself.

#### Is small really beautiful?

The answer to that question is Yes! When it comes to the exchange project at the Wensleydale school, small really is beautiful.

Small is Beautiful (SIB) is the name of a ground-breaking new project which creates links between small schools all over Europe. There are six schools within the project including schools in Norway, Hungary and Finland. Every month each of the partners contributes to a newsletter that is distributed to each school, containing reports about school life, recipes and phrases to use in the various countries; should you ever get the opportunity to visit them.

The main aim of the project is to create awareness of the benefits of attending a small school and the important part small schools play in communities all over Europe. Another aim is to set up exchange links between the schools; which I was lucky enough to partake in last October.

My exchange was to Finland and I stayed in the house of a Finnish girl and attended her school. I experienced all aspects of Finnish culture and even had the chance to sample reindeer meat - a local delicacy that was surprisingly tasty. The exchange gave me a chance to develop my communication skills and has made me grow in confidence in myself.

When it was time for the return leg of the exchange I was apprehensive about having someone staying in my house but I was pleasantly surprised, as the week went without many hitches and a fun time wa had by all. Students from Hungary. Slovakia, Norway and Finland all came over in the same week, so there was a great sense of community spirit within the school to try and make our international visitors feel welcome.

The programme is ongoing within the school and some students have recently come back from successful exchanges to Hungary and Slovakia with stories to tell and experiences to share.

The Small is Beautiful project shows us all that just because a school is small it doesn't necessarily mean it isn't a great place to be.

#### Adult Learning in Wensleydale

or those of you following the changes that are happening in Wensleydale you will not be surprised to learn that the financial coffers for post 19 Education are being squeezed and squeezed even further to fund initiatives in the 14-19 and Higher Education agendas and that this statement applies to the whole of the country. It is with some sadness that I re-call the tale of how five years ago Mondays used to be so busy with Creative Stitchery and Art classes; Tuesdays, Upholstery and Ceramics; Wednesdays, Spanish and a computer class during the day and most evenings, not forgetting residential parties of 26 coming to sample learning and the night life of Askrigg. Even though these are turbulent times the Wensleydale Centre seems to have a spirit of its own carrying it through year on year. Who would have thought in the last ten or so years when community representatives had the drive to put in place a facility that would provide better learning opportunities to the Upper Dales that it would come so close to closure yet still resist it?

There are, of course, many different reasons why things are changing, and they are not done changing yet, but I wanted to share with you the latest developments at Askrigg so that you can help keep the messages positive and encourage everyone who lives, works or visits the area to see The Centre as a key part of their learning needs. During the past few months Brin and his team have done an amazing job refurbishing what were the Dormitories (or should I say Science labs?) to transform them into the new Gym and Fitness Suite for the Yorebridge Sports Development Association to deliver a Community Gym Scheme along with a range of fitness related classes. The future strongly lies in 'partnership working', the sharing of resources and to this end we are moving our

activities out of the Caretakers House and are busy making preparations for what we hope will be a collaboration *as a* new base for the Children's Centre for Wensleydale. While plans are still in their infancy this facility will help support and build on the excellent services already offered by Dalesplay, the areas Childminders and other young peoples activity providers to ensure even better access to services are offered to dales families.

These are very exciting times and I hope you will be part of them by continuing to support and use the available facilities and encouraging others to do the same. There will be a further opportunity to ask questions and find out more on **November 29<sup>th</sup>** at Aysgarth Village Institute, 7.00pm -9.00pm or, as many of you do, when you see me around. **Colin Bailey.**

es, the Dale End Club which has been meeting the needs of older people at the top end of the dale, has closed down its activities.

"25th October, 1972

A temporary committee which had been elected at a public meeting on 17th October 1972 met to discuss plans for the formation of a club in Hawes for people over sixty. Mrs Mason was in the chair and the following members were present: Mr C Calvert, Mr T Jackson, Mrs Lockyer, Mrs Newton, Mrs Thwaite, Mrs Johnson and Mrs Kinchin (Secretary).

The room to be used at the Council Offices (that's where Littlefairs is now) was inspected and an informal discussion took place concerning the furniture and the drought-proofing of the room. Members offered gifts of chairs, tables, carpets crockery etc. and a piano.

It was decided to order 2cwt of coal and to hold a coffee morning... in order to raise funds to start the club. Mrs Newton suggested that the name 'Dale End Club' would be a suitable one. It was decided to consider this at the next meeting."

So reads the very first entry in an interesting first minute book which continued to recount the goings-on until 1988. (It has been passed to the Dales Countryside Museum)

At its height there were about 65 members and meetings consisted of talks, entertainment and games. Each year four trips were organised.

The club soon attracted well-remembered members— Mr and Mrs (Mollie) Baker and Ruth Powell from Sedbusk, Rev James Alderson, Mr and Mrs Outhwaite and Norrie Walker and many others. Committee meetings and the AGMs were often lively affairs with (according to the minutes) protracted discussion about subs.(5p per session to start with!)- or where to hold the Christmas meal!

As time went by the club changed its venue, first to the National School (Church Hall) and then for several years until closure in the Methodist rooms for easier access. **A.S.W.**

## lveson

urrently, there is a great interest in the tracing and recording of family histories. Here in the Yorkshire Dales many family roots are still growing where they originally started, decades, or even centuries ago. One such familiar name is that of 'Iveson' and here in Hawes the church register records the marriage of John Iveson to Kathleen Longstaff in 1716. Ivesons in the Hawes parish have descended from this union, and it is interesting to note the other familiar names dotted about the family tree. Names such as Dinsdale, Metcalfe, Pratt and Calvert.

One Richard Iveson of Brough near Hull looked into church records in Coverdale, Giggleswick and Settle and found that the earliest Iveson references are of John Iveson born 1490 and Roger Iveson born 1492. Both fought in the famous 'Flodden Field' in 1513. This was because, as tenants of Lord Clifford, a local landowner, they were conscripted to fight for the King.

But back to Hawes and Gayle. From 1717 to 1812 fifty seven Ivesons were baptised and from 1840 to 1900 sixty were baptised. On one Sunday in 1901, out of ten baptisms at Gayle chapel, nine were Ivesons!

The list of occupations reads like a social history. Linen weavers, woolcombers, knitters, quarrymen, wallers, drainers, road-men, butchers, stock-dealers, small holders, farmers, blacksmiths, carriers, shepherds, and miners, and as all families in the 18th Century did, they knew hardship, illness and infant death. From 1817 to 1865, twenty eight Iveson children Died, one family losing six out of seven children. Something hard for us to imagine now.

There were very few Christian names in circulation and there was a tradition of handing names down. This could lead to confusion. Therefore nicknames were often used, or a prefix of the mother's name. So you had 'Jappa', 'Crackon' and' Nelse'. This was often very necessary. The 1891 census records ten John Ivesons just at Gayle! The auction mart in Hawes was started in 1887 by TT Iveson and J Pratt. There was an H Iveson, Inkeeper of the Green Dragon at Hardraw.

John Iveson was the last schoolmaster at The National School in Hawes, which closed in 1879. He died in 1904 aged 70. It isn't clear how the actual name 'IVESON' originated. It would seem that it means either 'the son of Ives (or Ive)' or 'Ivy's son'. We just don't know but there are 'Ives' in the Darlington and Richmond area phone book.

As in all family histories there were rivalries and disputes, and sometimes these can lead to very long-standing resentments, the reasons for which have probably been lost in the mists of time! However, the fact remains that the Ivesons have very deep roots in this area, they are one of the longest established families here in Wensleydale and that their family history is also the history of the Dales. (Thanks to Margaret Iveson and to research by James Alderson of Gayle.) S.H.



was at the end of my tether. One of those dry, shady areas we all hate in the garden kept shouting at me for attention. Overhung by a dense canopy of sycamore branches, the soil was thin, dry and compacted and provided a challenge I had weakly chosen to avoid on several occasions.

A cold, bright morning in early November, the perfect time for splitting and rearranging plants for the following year provided me with no excuses. I selected Yellow Loosestrife, Bergenia, Euphorbia Griffithii and Lady's Mantle, as all of these 'bruisers' are able to cope with tougher conditions. Next I emptied the entire contents of a compost bin over the site and lightly dug it in. A seven year old mix of vegetable peelings and grass cuttings - delicious! I planted in groups of three to give a touch of symmetry to the proceedings. Too many single plants can look disjointed and fussy and tend to cancel each other out. Adding barrow loads of well- rotted manure to certain areas. I finished with a mixture of snowdrops and winter aconites to provide winter/spring colour.

On the whole the results were a success, although next time perhaps I will miss out the Lady's Mantle. Diligent deadheading is necessary with this opportunist! If the 'flower heads' are not cut off before they turn brown, it will seed into lawns and all over that favourite patio.

The snowdrops and aconites soon established themselves and now give a lovely contrast of yellows and whites at the start of the year, while later on in summer the heavyweights thrash it out. The Loosestrife gamely competes with the thick-stemmed, orange flowering Euphorbia, whilst the more modest Bergenias fill out the front of the border. Tough love is necessary for all of these plants; simply restrict by splitting and thinning but beware of adding any of the unwanted bits to your compost heap as they will probably take root and rapidly colonise it. Now **that** takes some sorting out... **Ed Gardener**



Heavens Above High in the southern sky on a late November evening you'll find a

bright, compact group of stars called The Pleiades or Seven Sisters. At first glance they appear to be merely a misty patch of light about two moon-widths across, but closer examination soon reveals 6 or 7 stars forming a shape a bit like a mini version of the Big Dipper. In a pair of binoculars they're a really astounding sight with dozens upon dozens of bluish-white stars filling the field-of-view. In fact there are over 500 stars in the cluster all told. For sheer spectacle nothing can beat The Pleiades and though there are lots of other fine "open" star-clusters on show at this time of year for binocular owners to explore you'll find you'll keep returning to them again and again.

In Greek mythology The Pleiades were the 7 daughters of Atlas and Pleione who were placed in the heavens by Zeus to enable them to escape the unwelcome attentions of Orion - the Mighty Hunter of ancient legend. A quick glance at the late autumn night sky soon reveals that Orion, in the shape of the famous constellation of the same name. still vainly chases after them to this very day. In fact you can use Orion's familiar blocky outline to help you locate The Pleiades if you're not quite certain where to find them. Just follow the distinct sloping line of the 3 bright stars forming the Hunter's Belt upwards past reddish Aldeberan (the leader of Taurus the Bull) and there they are.

Interestingly the BBC's Sky At Night programme is currently conducting a survey involving observations of The Pleiades. The aim is to try and check out iust how many on average can be seen by the unaided eye - some keen-sighted types claim they can glimpse up to 14! If you'd like to test your own eyesight and take part in this experiment you can obtain more information and an observation report form from:

## Before I lose my marbles (I've already lost one!)

#### ROCCO REA

When I was a lad the Italians had the ice cream business in the UK buttoned up; Wensleydale from Wensley to Bainbridge was allocated to **Rocco Rea**, and to Rocco the round was sacrosanct.

Living in Darlington Rocco travelled to the Dale every day in summer - but how did he travel? A belt-driven Triumph motor bike and sidecar, scarlet red, yellow letters and green-shaded "Rocco Rea's Cream ices".

He would arrive in Askrigg from Bainbridge about 5 pm (if there was not a show or sports meeting in the Dale) and parked near the Bull Ring - the only vehicle! Two honks on his black rubber balloon horn and all the children rushed out if they had a penny - if they hadn't they sobbed their eyes out till they got one!

Wedged in the side-car was a large oak barrel in which salted ice surrounded the metal ice cream canister.

Rocco did not dismount -just sat side saddle. He wore a battered trilby hat with woven hat band (what speed motor cycling in a trilby hat! ... would solve all the problems at Hawes on Sunday afternoon) He had black hair, milky coffee complexion, dark shaven bearded chin like coffee grounds!, white flannel blue striped shirt, no collar but a sparkling brass stud, sleeveless soiled leather jerkin, breeches, polished brown boots and shining brown leggings up to his knees.

He sold a limited selection - penny comets or two-penny sandwiches - six pennyworth if you took a bowl! - no choc ice or lollies. With his wooden spoon Rocco could fill 4 cornets at once.!!

In those days there were no village toilets

- he had nowhere to wash his hands, and he had to tickle the carburettor before the motor bike would start. BEST ICE CREAM I EVER HAD.

But Rocco was not always welcome - he came on Sunday afternoon. In the 1930s Sunday found all shops closed, no work was carried out other than essentials on the farm - milking, feeding etc. But the house wife had to work hard cooking an enormous Sunday lunch - for others it was Sunday suits and short walks. So the children of Askrigg were divided - those who could have ice cream on Sundays and those who could not.

But there was a way round it. Taking care to keep out of sight you went to play at the house of "those who could"!

I never heard Rocco speak and did not know him any better on his last day than his first - but then we realised that our endeared Rocco was not coming any more.

**Celebrations!** One day a smart Ford van arrived - same colour, this was Emma Rea (Rocco's daughter?) Emma was a pretty plump signorita; she had a sort of chauffeur to convey her and Rocco's old oak tub. Poor Emma— she spent all her time in the back of the small van sitting on a small stool with her back against the spare wheel and knees up to the old oak tub; same delicious ice cream but Emma had a white coat, same prices and same hygiene— or lack of it.

The back of the van sign written - yellow letters with green shading:

EMMA REA trading as ROCCO REA 12 CROSBY STREET DARLINGTON

- no telephone number, no post code, no web site, no e-mail address - however did they manage to live and trade in those days?

At the onset of World War 2 in 1939 all German and Italian nationals were interned, first to the Isle of Man and then to Canada. A liner conveying internees to Canada was torpedoed and sunk with large loss of internee life. The post-war years never brought Rocco or Emma back to the Dale, so we had to endure Walls and Eldorado in steralized tubs!

Gone were the days! *Yellow pages* tell me that in Newcastle there is a large manufacturing complex:

"REA'S ICES"
