'Don't Miss Christmas'

It was the last day of proceedings in the court before the Christmas Holiday and the judge was looking forward to joining his family as he faced his last prisoner. "And what are you charged with?" he asked. "Doing my Christmas shopping early" the defendant replied. "That's not a crime," said the judge. "How early had you started?" "Before the store had opened your honour."

Many of us like to begin our shopping and our preparations early. I read the other day of a man who was determined that this year he would do precisely that and had booked the day off work on December 23rd.

Many of us have had another difficult year with continuing restrictions, challenges and sadness caused by the pandemic but our experience this Christmas, even with appropriate Covid constraints, looks like being a more liberated one than last year. A staple joy of the season is the Nativity play and it's wonderful to hear of these taking place again, even if the audience might be watching a recording rather than being allowed in to watch the event live.

One young lad I heard of was very keen on being in his school's Nativity play and was desperate to be Joseph. The teacher announced the various parts and to his dismay he was given the role of the Innkeeper instead. He was very disappointed. The day of the performance arrived and in front of a packed school hall the story began to unfold until they reached the point where Mary and Joseph appeared on the stage and knocked loudly on the Innkeeper's door. The Innkeeper opened it and asked them what they wanted. The young lad playing Joseph replied: "Can my wife Mary and I come in for the evening?" The Innkeeper looked at them, thought for a moment and then said: "She can come in, but you can't!.. I wanted to be Joseph!"

So Joseph was left out of that particular Christmas story as he wasn't welcome and it changed the experience and the understanding of what the events were all about. It can be easy for us to do a similar thing, sometimes without even realising it. We might let Mary in, but keep out the reality of her background and the sacrifice she went through. We might let the

baby in, but keep out the man that he grew into. We might let Santa in.. but keep out the one that the celebration is all about and the gift he came to give us; a gift that we truly need and one that will never fade or wear out. If we lock some of the story out, we miss its truth and its power.

The Innkeeper in the actual Nativity showed more grace and compassion but what happened to him after that? We hear nothing more. He missed Christmas. It was happening there right in front of him and he missed it. Perhaps he was distracted by the busyness of his work; meals to make, drinks to serve, guests to look after, and so he missed it. What a name that would have been to get in the Visitors Book. He could even have had a blue plaque on the door but he misses the greatest moment in human history, right there on his own doorstep. Our personal busyness can prevent us from experiencing the reality and the significance of what took place that night.

The religious leaders of the day missed Christmas. They knew the Messiah was to be born in Bethlehem and told King Herod so, but they couldn't be bothered to travel a few miles down the road, and so they missed it. They were distracted by a sense of their own importance; "It's not for me", "What would people think if I showed an interest?" Worrying about what others might think of us can prevent us from experiencing the reality and the significance of what took place that night.

King Herod missed Christmas. He knew something very important was taking place, but he let his pride get in the way, and so he missed it. An unwillingness to consider or explore the possibility that there may be truth in what so many say they know and have personally encountered, can prevent us from experiencing the reality and the significance of what took place that night.

Wherever you are, I invite you to take some time from your crowded schedule and consider why billions of people alive right now believe that God came to earth that night to change things for the better and that we might know him, close up and personal. Why not pay a visit to a church service in your area and discover more?

I close with the final words of the popular carol 'O little town of Bethlehem'.

We hear the Christmas Angels the great glad tidings tell;

O come to us, abide with us, Our Lord Emmanuel'

May you know the peace and the presence of Emmanuel (God with us) in your hearts and in your homes this Christmas.

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Lottie Launches Hair and Beauty Salon in Askrigg

From mobile to main street - Lottie Handley's journey is a real 'local girl makes good' story.



Born in Aysgarth, Lottie trained locally in beauty therapy, gained experience in local salons and after completing a hairdressing and barbering course, set up her own mobile hair and beauty business - all while bringing up three children! She lives in Bainbridge with her husband Daniel and has just opened her first salon on Main Street in Askrigg.

Lottie built up a large, loyal clientele with her mobile business and was in demand for weddings and hair parties. She enjoyed the work and relationships she built up with clients, but so much time was spent travelling between appointments she was finding it difficult to balance work with caring for a growing family. Lottie has always been keen to keep up with new techniques, so she can offer clients a wide range of beauty treatments, but this involved investing in more equipment that was difficult to transport around. She was just looking into the possibility of her own salon when covid struck.

Lockdown was tough for those in the hairdressing industry and Lottie like many other businesses had to close. As a young business she was unable to access government grants and didn't want to take out loans. She felt very lucky to survive, having as she did, the support of a wonderful family. The premisses in Askrigg became available just as lockdown rules were eased in August and she took the gamble to open her own salon. With the help of her in-laws, Jim and Vicky, they transformed the shop in just three weeks into a stylish hairdressing and beauty salon. She received a start-up grant from Richmondshire District Council to invest in equipment for hydro and

high frequency facial treatments and hasn't looked back. Lottie uses only natural, vegan friendly products that she knows produce reliably great results. She uses and sells Milkshake hair products and Eve Taylor skincare range.

Many of her old clients now travel to the Salon from as far away as York and new clients are attracted by the range of hair and beauty treatments Lottie offers from eyelash tints, waxing, manicure, pedicure and facials. She is so busy that she had to increase her opening hours and is bringing in a friend, Liam who she trained with at college, to help on Thursdays in the run up to Christmas.

She has been overwhelmed by the support she has had locally to get the salon set up and running so quickly and wants to give back to the community that have supported her so well. Lottie already has big plans for the future, she has planning permission for a log cabin in Newbiggin where she hopes to set up a beauty treatment centre where she can provide much needed, local opportunities for young people graduating from beauty and hairdressing courses.

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Prunings

I was filling the bird feeders when I caught a glimpse of something moving. Keeping very still, I waited, and the little mouse that had just run across the flags ran back. It was a real "Timmie Willie". Beatrix Potter fans may recognise this. The one on my patio was gingery brown and very flat to the ground – not the usual grey creature that I have often seen before. Simon Reeve's programme "The Lake District" featured a lady trying to preserve the Red Squirrel, and she had been a devotee since reading "Squirrel Nutkin" as a child. I wonder how many of us have Beatrix Potter to thank for her magical introductions of wildlife into our lives as children.

The strangely mild Autumn has produced some unusual effects: There are still blooms on the Rose of Sharon and some of the Dahlias, but at the same time the Winter Jasmine and Winter Clematis are already flowering, not to mention some gorgeous pink roses, a profusion of Fuchsia and a Diascia I had cut back springing into life with new foliage and blossom. Most of the Begonias have missed most of the frost there has been and the Phuopsis has started again. If I don't do something with it, it will overwhelm the front steps.

Two years ago I bought some pincushion Chrysanthemums. They gave us a lovely show in large pots. Having survived the winter, they have been subsequently a waste of space. I had not realized that they are meant to be disposable plants. In creating them, nurseries introduce a growth retardant which reduces the length of the internodes between set of leaves giving very compact plants. By the following year the plant has expelled the retardant from its system and will return to "normal". Mine grew long and lank with very few flowers. So the lesson is, buy them, enjoy them, but don't try to keep them going.

"Garden News" had a lot to say about Tulips. They come in all shapes and sizes from huge peony and parrot flowered through straight singles, lily flowered types, emperors, rembrandts and last of all, the many beautiful species tulips which do well in pots and will thrive and naturalise in rockeries. Some are spectacular. Lasagne planting, or putting them in the pots in layers works well and means that earlier flowering bulbs and smaller choices can go in at the top. As a system it is most effective

and produces a wonderful display of colour over quite a long period. However, the display is unlikely to repeat the following year, and to get the best effect you have to start again, although, of course, the smaller spring bulbs can be replanted and will fire off again.

We are almost at the end of another strange year and I should like to wish everyone a really Merry Christmas. Who knows what next year will bring but I trust we will make Merry in the best way we can and hope for happier times and glorious gardens. Whatever happens we know that the plants will still grow, including the weeds, and the seasons will not fail. Have a Happy and Peaceful time.

Whatever you grow, take time to enjoy it!

"Receiving the collection of the former Yorkshire Dales Mining Museum from Earby in 2017 was a particular catalyst for change and investment. Making space for such industrial treasures as the Providence Mine Ore Crusher has led to us creating fresh galleries for other parts of the collection, such as textiles."

"An upgrade to the exhibition hall has meant our special exhibitions are even more special, with this year's exhibitions telling stories about Dales schools, fell runners and hand knitters. We've also improved our digital offering, making our oral history collection publicly accessible this year via the 'Voices From The Dales' podcast."

"Much of this has been possible owing to grants from Museum Development Yorkshire, the Arts Council, National Lottery Heritage Fund and Friends of the DCM. Their support has meant we have been able to work more with local people and organisations to find and tell compelling stories."

"The DCM is open seven days a week until Christmas and our current special exhibition is a striking display of knitting sticks from the John Dixon Collection. There's a shop stocked with local goods, as well as a café on site, too. I recommend making a date to visit this 'Hidden Gem'."

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New World War One Plaque in Aysgarth Church

A plaque with the names of 12 more servicemen from Aysgarth parish who lost their lives during World War I has been installed on the north wall of St Andrew's Church, Aysgarth.

The information about the servicemen was found by Penny Ellis during her detailed research prior to the 2018 Commemoration of the Centenary of the Armistice and was then checked several times to ensure accuracy.

The original plaque, installed by John Pickard and Son of Aysgarth just after the Great War, listed 20 servicemen. After World War II a plaque with four names was added and then one in memory of Captain Philip Guy RM who died in Iraq in 2003.

Installing the new plaque included taking down all the existing plaques and reorganising them to be in sequential historical order. When the frame for the original Great War plaque was removed large wooden plugs were revealed.

"That's the way my father taught me," commented David Pickard, while his son, John, and son-in-law James Guy, worked on moving it. They were grateful they didn't need such plugs this time.

Aysgarth Parochial Church Council (APCC) plans now to refurbish the area beside the plaques.

Nick Gaskell, who is overseeing the project for Aysgarth Parochial Church Council, stated: "Currently, on Remembrance Sundays, the Act of Remembrance is conducted around the plaques. There is very little room for clergy,

officials and wreath layers, to conveniently access the area to lay wreaths. As a result, the wreath laying procedure is awkward and rather undignified."

Leeds Diocese has given approval for just the three short pews beside the plaques to be removed with suitable parts of them being used to construct a wooden memorial structure. This work will be carried out early next year.

The Rev Tom Ringland said: "With Remembrance continuing to be such a significant feature in society, I'm delighted we will be able to create a more accessible and appropriate memorial in St Andrew's church, including the addition of recently discovered names of the fallen. Thank you to everyone who has contributed to the project."

The project has been funded by local donations. Once the joinery and plumbing work is complete the APCC plans to have good lighting installed by the plaques.

For Penny Ellis the research continues. She has added 19 additional names to the Roll of Honour for all who served from Aysgarth Parish bringing the total to 212 men and women. The WWI Roll of Honour can be viewed on her website www.thoralbythroughtime.net.

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Red Squirrels Maintain Dales Stronghold

The 'near threatened' native red squirrel is maintaining its range in the Yorkshire Dales National Park, a monitoring report has concluded.



There is also anecdotal evidence that the reds' range may have increased in recent years. The grey squirrel control undertaken in the National Park's 'core area' for reds —

mainly Sedbergh, Garsdale and the Upper Eden valley – is said to have been a 'crucial' factor.

The conservation research and monitoring report has been published by the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority in partnership with Red Squirrels Northern England (RSNE). It has been produced as a result of the 2011 Local Biodiversity Action Plan, which identified red squirrel as a priority species for conservation within the National Park. The completion of the ten-year action plan, at the end of last year, has prompted an assessment of the status of priority species and habitats.

Co-author Heinz Traut, Project Manager at RSNE, said: "The results detailed in our report show that red squirrels have maintained their range in the core areas of the Yorkshire Dales National Park since at least 2012. This is thanks

to the dedication and efforts of many local volunteers, land managers and organisations, including YDNPA, which have helped red squirrels to thrive here. Where the provision of suitable habitat and the exclusion of grey squirrel competition is facilitated, reds will continue to do so."

The Member Champion for Natural Environment at the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority, Ian McPherson, said: "There are four red squirrel groups working in the National Park and this monitoring report is a testament to their committed stewardship. For many years now the Penrith and District, Mallerstang, Garsdale and Sedbergh red squirrel groups have been keeping an eye on the native reds and culling the greys, which otherwise would likely take over."

"Given the long-standing work of these local groups in the Cumbria part of the National Park, the National Park Authority has focussed its work in North Yorkshire where no active groups are present. We are delighted that red squirrels in places such Langstrothdale and Snaizeholme are doing well. would like to echo the authors' note of caution about the reds' expansion to places such as mid-Wensleydale: it is not clear if there is sufficient suitable habitat and grey squirrel control for the reds' to sustain their expanded range. More conservation work must be done in the National Park to help red squirrels but for now we can celebrate that populations of this priority species continue to be stable."

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Johnny Walker Laithe

Upper Wensleydale Sports and Recreational Association trustee directors have appointed GTEC Construction Ltd to carry out the formal conversion of the laithe on Hawes Community Fields to community use. The laithe is by the roadside on Brunt Acres Road, at the entry into the Community Fields.

The mini-pavilion will be named the Johnny Walker Laithe, in recognition of a donation being made to UWSRA by Lt Col (Ret) David (John) Walker MBE in honour of his Father John (the late Johnny Walker who ran Hawes Chippie).

Toilets and sinks will be installed in the stalls side of the laithe. The mew side of the laithe will have downstairs and upstairs rooms for shelter and other uses. The lean-to will be enlarged and rebuilt, providing storage for local clubs' kit and equipment. Mains water and electricity will be installed.

Other elements of the project to improve facilities on Hawes Community Fields have received planning permission and, last month, became fully funded almost overnight with the offer of a £50,000 grant from Richmondshire District Council's Community Investment Fund. Hawes United Juniors FC also raised £5,000.

It means that we can now press on and convert the small stone shed into a kitchen 'match hatch' facility, make the big field big enough to hold a football pitch, and install a new pedestrian access point further up Brunt Acres Road.



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Just a reminder, the charity which runs Hawes Community Fields on behalf of the community is called the Upper Wensleydale Sports and Recreational Association (UWSRA). It was set up in 1997 to take ownership of the Community Fields and it currently has nine trustee directors.

The UWSRA Annual General Meeting will be held on **Wednesday**, **January 5th at 7.30pm** at the Nash. Please do come along.

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Young Rangers Achieve Award

A total of 37 people from the Dales and surrounding areas have received a John Muir Award after volunteering as 'Dales Young Rangers'. Each spent between four and twenty days in wild places in the Yorkshire Dales National Park, often carrying out practical conservation tasks such as wildlife surveys or collecting used plastic tree guards.

The Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority began running a Young Rangers programme in the Craven part of the National Park in 2013. In 2016 the scheme received external funding to expand to cover the other districts of the National Park. Two groups – South and North – currently meet monthly.

Young Rangers is one of two youth volunteer programmes run by the Authority, with the other – Generation Green – currently looking to support young people find a route to employment in the 'green economy'.

To achieve a John Muir Award, each participant must meet the 'Four Challenges' to discover, explore, conserve and share wild places. Of the 37 Young Rangers to have received their John Muir Award certificates, 11 of them achieved the top level 'Conserver' award in acknowledgment of their long term commitment to volunteering in the Yorkshire Dales National Park.

One of those to receive a Conserver award, Benji Grundy, who has recently become a countryside worker apprentice, said: "Receiving the John Muir Award through Young Rangers means a lot to me. Being able to discover, explore, conserve and share these natural landscapes in the Yorkshire Dales is something that I have loved. To achieve the award I took part in many Young Ranger days that covered the first three challenges and wrote a couple of blog posts on my days for the share challenge."

John Muir Award Cumbria Manager Graham Watson said: "It's only by getting out and being active in connecting with our local wild places that we come to value and care for them. These Young Rangers have put that into action with great commitment; John Muir would be proud of them and I congratulate them on achieving their John Muir Awards".

Member Champion for Recreation Management at the National Park Authority, Nick Cotton, said: "It's wonderful to see how

much the Young Rangers have gained from their activities in the Dales. Their passion for improving the environment shines through. I liked it when they put together choice quotes from the writings of John Muir, reflecting the strength, joy and knowledge that can be gained from spending time outdoors in beautiful places."

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Will It Be DIY or Do Without, 2022-2023?

LNER is currently providing a subsidy for the popular Northallerton - Bedale - Leyburn - Aysgarth - Bainbridge - Hawes/Gayle Sunday DalesBus 856. This is because the railway company recognises the value of the connection provided at Northallerton station for passengers boarding and alighting from trains. In recent years, a number of local and regional businesses, local councillors and other donors have also provided funding for this particular service. The 856 runs all year round and valid passes for free bus travel are accepted.

However, although there is much talk of possible government funding for future bus services, at present no reassurance can be given about the continuation of the DalesBus 856 beyond Easter, when the LNER funding ends.

A written approach is therefore being made to all the 19 parish councils along the route (and others close enough to it for their residents and

He said that even a path for a horse would be sufficient. The men dug a path at night by lantern-light and were nearly to Countersett when it thawed!

I was born on March 10th, Elaine Eubank, nee Bell. My future husband, Tom Eubank, lived at Temple Farm and remembers, when he was four, his mother carrying him out of the house to see three horses in a line pulling a wooden snowplough with a pole to keep the plough steady. Two men held it and one man led the horses. The men and plough came from West Burton.

Dear Editor,

As a local resident, I am horrified at the continued destruction of the roadside at Garsdale and surrounding area, by the CCC department. Government highways The provided funds to the CCC to improve road safety along the A684, as well as some other major routes in the area. Consultation during the Covid 19 Lockdown was minimal and did not express the scale and degree of changes that were to be carried out. My family and neighbours in Garsdale feel powerless to stop the ongoing programme of installing metal railings or reflective bollards that are destroying the rural environment, of which they have been rightly proud and wish to protect.

It has become apparent that the new measures have made it unsafe for dog walkers and tourist ramblers to use, as there is no grass verge to be accessed easily to distance themselves from passing traffic.

The new measures have made the road look narrower, so tall vehicles naturally adopt a more central position, but often are unable to pass other similar vehicles, creating delays and potential accidents. Given the abundance of dips, brows and winding nature of the road, the risk of accidents is increased for all users, not just visitors who are unfamiliar with every twist and turn.

The new measures have created a further hazard for motor bikers and cyclists, with increased danger of greater physical damage in any accident.

The new measures are excessive in number, out of character and unsightly in design, within this National Park area.

As a result of continuous complaints, Highways have now been challenged by the Parish Council. Highways have only explained that all correct procedures were carried out prior to works being approved for the improvement of road safety and that no changes will now be entertained. This is an unacceptable stance, as our environment is being decimated by the scale and degree of works. Local feeling is that most of the alterations are unjustifiable, based on actual knowledge of the history of this road and the statistics relating to accidents in this area. If you agree that Highways should rethink their plan, please contact them or the Garsdale Parish Council website with your views.

Gayle Mill Christmas Market

The popular Christmas market at Gayle Mill returns for two days this December thanks to Makers Market organisers Anne Barden and Emma Trussler of Swaledale.

The Makers Market and Vintage Christmas Fair on Saturday, December 11th and Sunday, December 12th at Gayle Mill, will provide an opportunity to discover inspiring gifts made by independent craftspeople. There will be cards, hand-made soap, Christmas decorations, handmade candles, Nepali fashion, vintage collectibles, vintage clothing and accessories, home fragrance, bath and body and much more on sale.

Emma Trussler has described Gayle Mill as an exciting new venue for future events. It was built in 1784 and is the oldest unaltered mill building in the United Kingdom. It has become the embodiment of 'industrial evolution' in this country having been used for milling, in turn, cotton, flax and wool before becoming a sawmill from 1860 to 1988. Its third and final turbine now generates electricity for the National Grid when there is water in Gayle Beck.

Owned by Cultura Trust it re-opened to the public earlier this year following work to make the building safe and easier to operate.

The Fox at West Witton

The Fox and Hounds pub in West Witton is locally known as 'The Fox', partly to avoid confusion with the Fox and Hounds in West Burton. It has recently changed hands. The previous owner, always known as 'Blackie', was one of the longest established landlords in Wensleydale, having been at The Fox for over 25 years. The new owners, John and Joanne, have only been there since August. They intend to keep it as a traditional pub although they do have one or two changes planned for the future.

I went to see them one midweek lunchtime in October. They asked me to go through to the kitchen so that they could talk to me while they prepared food for lunch. They do have a chef who cooks evening meals but lunches are made by John and Joanne. It was a slightly bizarre interview in a way because the answers to my questions were interspersed with a running commentary on food preparation: ("that cheese sandwich needs tomato slices"; "more salad needed please"). However, I did manage to find out that neither of them had run a pub before. John had been an electrical engineering consultant, working for many years in Sweden. He had wanted to run a pub for quite a while. Joanne, I gathered, had been in education development. They both knew the Dales 'a bit' but not really well. When they saw The Fox on the market it was just what they wanted. They had both enjoyed their first few months and their enthusiasm was very obvious. As lunchtime went on it got increasingly busy and I kept finding I was in the way in the limited space available.

As for future developments, John took me into the back room, which had been completely gutted. He showed me a seventeenth century fireplace, which he was hoping to make a central

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feature of a snug room. Other plans were to refurbish the letting rooms upstairs, which hadn't been used for some time, and to develop log cabins behind the pub which might be used by hillwalking groups.

The bar menu is traditional but home-made and locally sourced where possible. In this respect The Fox has always been a counterbalance to the more ambitious Wensleydale Heifer up the road. John says "There'll be nothing fancy, just good wholesome food."

It sounded definitely worth a try to me. The evening menu is quite extensive; the lunch menu is lighter bites with some interesting touches; for example, instead of a ploughman's lunch, it's a haymaker's lunch because there is no ploughed land hereabouts.

Now that pubs are emerging from the damaging effects of pandemic restrictions, it is hoped that the business will be a success. Have a look in next time you are passing: to book a table ring 01969 623650 or email info@foxwitton.co.uk. I am sure you won't be disappointed.

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Hawes In Bloom

First, some good news! Hawes has been awarded a sum of money from a new Government Funded Initiative known as the 'Welcome Back Fund' to help communities like ours to recover from the traumas connected with the Covid epidemic. Locally this is being distributed by Richmondshire District Council.

To quote from the Council's Briefing Note, the criteria required to obtain funds include the 'need to boost the look and feel of high streets by investing in street planting, parks, green spaces, and seating areas'.

Some of this funding will enable us to provide 10 large permanent planters at appropriate positions around the town. These will be planted in such a way that they will provide year-round interest with the added bonus of spring and summer H I B colours together with the necessary maintenance throughout the year.

Unfortunately, the not so good news is that H I B will not be supplying the usual large hanging baskets in the High Street from now on. Darlington Borough Council has informed me that reluctantly, they are no longer in a position to do so. However, if any business wishes to source their own baskets they are of course encouraged to do so!

Fortunately, I have been able to confirm the separate supply of the usual excellent summer bedding plants that we use to plant up the many other containers around town, including the Town Foot traffic islands, Church railings, Market House window boxes, school railings and of course the Memorial Green opposite and so on. I even hope to be able to increase the number of troughs as these are much easier to maintain throughout the summer months, thus drastically reducing my workload, including early morning watering sessions those throughout the summer!

To summarise:

Hawes In Bloom will not in future supply hanging baskets of any size and I'm afraid I cannot personally be involved in the sourcing of any alternative baskets.

Hawes In Bloom will supply and plant the other usual containers (and more!).

The Town has the opportunity to have in addition, ten large smart permanent planted containers.

Finally I would just like to emphasise that the whole scheme is made possible by the wonderful band of volunteers without whom it would not happen. Thanks too for the tremendous support shown by so many Hawes businesses and residents. Long may it continue so that we can have our Hawes in Bloom!

The Welcome Back Fund

In addition to the funding described in the Hawes in Bloom article, the town will be able to purchase four new quality hardwood street benches (as already supplied in previous years). These would be replacements for existing broken or unserviceable seats already in position.

It is hoped too that funding may stretch to replacing two existing old public Notice Boards.

Finally, we may even be able to provide two new replacement picnic tables down at the Town Foot children's play area.

A personal high point was watching Jack Pearce (Saxophone) open the Saturday evening concert. Jack joined BlueBoxt when he was 14 and is now in his first year at Leeds Conservatoire - another great example of how the opportunities we offer can spark young people to follow their interests and set them on career defining journeys.

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YDNPA's Reaction to the RSPB **Birdcrime Report 2020**

Commenting on the RSPB Birdcrime Report 2020, Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority Chief Executive David Butterworth said: "This report makes grim reading for all landscape authorities, landowners, managers and other partners who are working hard to call out and tackle illegal raptor persecution, and it's embarrassing and humiliating to see North Yorkshire yet again topping the league table with the highest number of confirmed incidents."

"As we've said before, the continuing issue of bird of prey persecution in North Yorkshire demands maximum exposure, as do the activities of those who take part in this criminality. People need to know what is happening here and the devastating impact this is having on our protected species. This report lays that bare. The Yorkshire Dales National

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"I would appeal to anyone, local or visitor, who witnesses any suspicious activity while they're out and about in the countryside, or anyone who is made aware of it through their networks, to contact the Police".

For concerns about a possible wildlife crime, you should call 101. If you witness a suspected wildlife crime in action, call 999 immediately and ask for the Police. Finally, you can speak in confidence about raptor persecution directly with the RSPB on **0300 9990101**.

Police Report

Hello, by way of introduction I have taken over as Beat Manager for The Dales after the retirement of Julian Sutcliffe. I was previously Beat Manager of Richmond town and have been based at Richmond for over 15 years. I have lived in Richmond and The Dales most of my life and spend a lot of my spare time on family walks in The Dales with my dogs.

Incidents of note over the last month:

Overnight on October 1st one of the buildings at Dales Bike Centre at Grinton was broken in to. Nothing was taken, believed due to robust security measures. However, roof tiles were removed, and damage caused which was valued at £2,000 at least and many hours remedial work for the owners.

On October 12th, 3 persons entered The Alchemist's Cottage at Hawes. Two of them distracted staff whilst the third concealed items in her bag and left without paying. They remain unidentified.

On October 20th, over 50 pheasants along with a buzzard have been found poisoned over a period of days, on land near Wensley and Redmire. A joint investigation with natural England is ongoing.

Sadly, there was a road traffic fatality in Leyburn. There were also 12 further road traffic collisions reported throughout the month, the vast majority of which resulted in either no or minor injuries.

With the weather and road conditions changing at this time of year it is worth having a winter health check carried out on your vehicle for your safety and that of other road users.

On a sad note, PCSO Lucy Osborn has left her role with North Yorkshire Police at the end of September.

I'm sure everyone will want to wish her well in her new endeavours and thank her for her service to our communities.

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

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Heavens Above

We're treated to one of the best meteor displays of the year this month – the annual Geminid shower which reaches its peak on the night of **December 13th/14th**. Weather permitting you could see well over 80 multi-coloured shooting stars an hour if it's a good year. Best viewing will be from a dark location well after midnight when the Moon has set.

If you're out and about just after sunset during December and early January you'll find we've a spectacular 'Christmas Star' in the shape of the planet Venus. It's extremely low in the southwest so you'll need to have a clear horizon to catch it. During the first week of January, Venus is joined by Mercury, the innermost planet, along with the ringed planet Saturn, with Jupiter, the largest planet, to the trio's upper left. On January 5th around 5.00pm, the 4 planets are accompanied by a slim crescent Moon - a lovely sight in the deepening twilight.

After last month's cold snap It's hard to believe that winter doesn't officially begin until the solstice on **December 21st**. This is the time when the Sun reaches its lowest point in the sky and we get the longest night and shortest day. Well before the solstice, however, you'll find most of the winter constellations on show in the south by late evening. Orion, the grandest of them all, dominates the scene. He was the Mighty Hunter of the old Greek myths and his distinctive outline with a sloping line of 3 stars forming his 'Belt' is unmistakeable. Betelgeuse, a red super-giant star, marks his right shoulder with blue-white Rigel, diagonally opposite,



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forming his left knee. See if you can spot his 'Sword' – a hazy patch of light hanging below the middle star of his Belt. It's a huge cloud of interstellar gas and dust many light years across which shows up well in binoculars.

Above and to Orion's right you'll find his old enemy, Taurus the Bull, home to the lovely Hyades and Pleiades star clusters. Another reddish star, Aldeberan, marks the bovine's baleful eye. Above his head lies Capella the She Goat, the brilliant yellow leader of Auriga the Charioteer. Castor and Pollux, the twin stars of Gemini, lie to the Hunter's upper left with Procyon, his smaller hunting dog, just below them. From a dark rural site, you should be able to see the winter Milky Way running down past Procyon from the distinctive 'W' of Cassiopeia high in the north-west towards the south-eastern horizon. On the way it brushes Orion's larger dog, Sirius, the brightest of all the stars. On a clear winter's night it's a magnificent sight, sparkling like a great diamond in the frosty air. Here's hoping for clear skies in 2022.

Enjoy an evening of music and song, join in the community Carols accompanied by the band, to commence the celebration of the Christmas Season.



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


Parish Forums Resume

On Wednesday, October 13th the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority held its first Parish Forum since its meetings were suspended last year due to Covid-19.

Representatives from all 99 Parish Councils/ Meetings in the National Park were invited, and those who attended discussed issues ranging from road traffic speed and noise to visitor management, sustainability and dark skies.

Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority Chair Neil Heseltine said: "These forums are a great opportunity for open, two-way discussion

I particularly welcomed the important discussion around sustainability and the challenge from parishes for the Authority to be a leader and exemplar for what a modern sustainable National Park should be, providing expertise and advice locally, and not being afraid of bold and radical solutions to deal with the climate emergency."

"It's clear that, in order for North Yorkshire and Cumbria to become a carbon negative region by 2040, the scale of the change will be breath-taking, requiring huge cultural shifts. And as a new National Park Management Plan starts taking shape in the coming 18 months, we will look to be even more ambitious".

The meeting also heard from the Authority's Director of Park Services on protecting the dark sky through good lighting schemes and a North Yorkshire street lighting project to help parishes improve the street lighting they own.

Mr Heseltine said; "I'm already looking forward to meeting up again in the new year to hear more innovative ideas, activities and projects taking place in the National Park".

Notes From Thorney Mire - Autumn

It's the second week in November and I am sitting outside with a cup of coffee writing this. There are still a lot of leaves on the trees and what a wonderful display of colours they've provided this year. We have dahlias, fuchsias, geraniums and roses, to name a few still in flower, which is pushing the winter back. A poppy which has set itself, flowered for the first time for Remembrance Day. Along the lane a red campion is in flower. No doubt the first ground frost, which is late this year, will put an end to all this.

After I had been living here for a few years, a visiting friend asked me if I still got pleasure from looking at the scenery or, had I got used to it? My answer was, that no, I never get tired at looking at the countryside around me. In the different seasons and the varying lights there is always something new to see.

It's the same with wildlife. It would be easy to become complacent and blasé with it all. I have to remind myself that seeing from home in a space of a few days, buzzards flying overhead, a treecreeper four feet away from me pecking at the moss in a wall basket, just outside the kitchen window, watching a red squirrel run along the branches of the sycamore tree and across the road into our courtyard and a tawny owl sitting on a wall near home before flying across the fields, a lovely sight in the Autumn sunlight, (especially as it shouldn't be out in the daytime), that this is not normal for everyone.

I like to watch Autumnwatch and its sister programmes. I'm interested when they are telling me something I don't know, or explaining the latest research, but when they go ecstatic as the infra-red cameras have picked up a hare or stoat, I think, "I'll go and put the kettle on." I have to remember that not everyone lives in a rural environment and if you live in a city or town and step outside into a concrete jungle, for them the night time image of a stoat or hare could be quite thrilling. It's all relative.

A few years ago, we went to see the ospreys near Bassenthwaite in the Lake District. On the way from the car park to the viewing centre there were information boards giving us facts about ospreys. On one we were told that an osprey's nest is the size of a double bed. At the next information point there was a full-size mock-up of an osprey's nest. You had to wonder how a bird could build a construction of this size and get it to stay stable and secure in a

tree without the aid of flat pack instructions, nails, screws and superglue. It's in their interests to make a good job of it as they tend to come back to the same nests each year and carry out a bit of D.I.Y. We were joined at the viewing point by another couple and a curious red squirrel. The other couple were excited about the red squirrel, me less so, I'd come to see the ospreys, because although being widely distributed in the world, in Britain they are rare, but I do remember my excitement on seeing my first red squirrel which was in the Lake District in the 1990s.

Later on in the same week, I met a couple who had recently moved to live near Bassenthwaite. They told me that they watched the ospreys fishing on the lake from their house. Well imagine that, sitting in the comfort of your own living room with a cuppa and a chocolate biscuit, watching ospreys fishing on the lake.

On another occasion we were on a boat on Windermere and several swans could be seen by the shoreside. I overheard two American ladies in front of me say, "Isn't it lovely to see swans in their natural habitat, all we get are boring flamingos". Two years ago, when we were travelling through Chile, the guide stopped the coach so that we could get off to look at the flamingos on the lake. The light was fading and the flamingos were some distance away but this didn't stop us from taking photographs, as this for us, was an unusual sight. After all you don't get flamingos on Semerwater, well at least you didn't the last time I looked.
