## **Guest Editorial**

As the editor of the Friends of the Dales Countryside Museum's annual newsletter, 'Now Then', I've had the fascinating job of preparing for publication the extraordinary memoir of the young cobbler from Hawes, Doug Grainger, who served as a balloon operator on the front line during the last year of WWI.

It led me to think about another Wensleydale hero of WWI – but he was not recognised as such until his funeral at Bainbridge in 1942. For John Leyland was scorned as a "Conchie" – a conscientious objector due to his Quaker beliefs. At his funeral many dalesfolk heard for the first time that he had been awarded the Croix de Guerre for his bravery in driving ambulances under fire to bring the wounded from the front line.

During WWI the government was very much in control of the narrative about who were heroes and who were demonised for having the wrong views about the war. Character assassination was used to destroy dissent.

The government no longer has so much control due to influencers and the social media. Character assassination now hinges on using cancel culture and labelling those who don't completely agree with a specific viewpoint as phobics and bigots.

There are influencers who argue farmers are the most destructive force ever to be unleashed by humans and that farming is to blame for nature decline. For those influencers there doesn't seem to be any half-measures rewilding must be completely embraced and National Parks are expected to lead the way.

The Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's draft Nature Recovery Plan will not, therefore, please some influencers. It recognises that the National Park is largely owned and managed by farmers and those landowners with interests in sporting and forestry management – and the need to work with them.

It states: "Fortunately, most landowners manage holistically and are passionate about nature on their land." And of those managing grouse moors and other sporting interests: "Many landowners, agents and keepers have worked positively for nature, for example through restoring blanket bogs and through adaptive management to enable sustainable breeding populations of birds such as black grouse, curlew, lapwing, golden plover, ring ouzels and merlin. There have been tensions over issues such as birds of prey and moorland burning, but there are great opportunities for fuller nature recovery and again these can be achieved with joint listening, learning and good cooperation."

I couldn't help but notice that one of the aims listed in the plan is to create interlinked naturerich hubs – corridors and "stepping stones" which enable species to move between them as they feed, disperse, migrate or reproduce. When I look out from my home towards Carperby Moor and Ellerkin Scar I see a very good example of that thanks to the farmers and landowners who planted trees and allowed areas to "rewild" such as along what was the railway line.



The draft plan accepts there is a need to work with the whole community if the habitats and wildlife in the National Park are to be improved. So we should all be involved. Hopefully, we will follow the lead of the YDNPA regarding nature recovery rather than that of those influencers who, in effect, demonise farmers and landowners through character assassination. Little will be achieved if we do the latter.

#### Newsletter Higher Education Grant

Once again this Autumn, the Newsletter will be offering a grant of £400 to students living in the Newsletter area (as indicated on the front cover), who are about to commence higher education, following completion of their compulsory education - either the first year of a university course or practical higher education training (eg, HNC, HND, BTEC Level 4 and above, Foundation and Bachelor Degrees). Please note that this grant is only available to those in their **first year of study**.

This grant is not restricted purely to academic studies, but also includes practical courses and learning/instruction in skills which will improve opportunities for employment (such as cookery, hairdressing, beauty etc). In the past, this grant has been used by successful applicants to purchase not only text books but also laptops, sewing machines, cookery knives and beauty kit.

Applicants should apply in writing, or by email, including name, address and contact details. Please give details of the university, college or specialist training facility where studies will take place, together with details of the course/training being followed.

If an application is successful, receipts will be required for the purchase of books or equipment and, once these have been received and checked, the grant will be made.

Please forward your application to the Newsletter (see address and email details on the back of the Newsletter), to be received **before or during the first year of study**.

Trees have been planted at the wooded knoll and the big field has been made big enough for a full-size sports pitch, with the redrawn boundary being expertly re-walled. Do come and have a look! Other key financial supporters were Richmondshire District Council Community Investment Fund, as well as the National Park Authority's Sustainable Development Fund and Hawes United Juniors FC.

## New Lease of Life For Bainbridge Methodist Chapel

The Upper Dales Community Land Trust (UDCLT) has confirmed it has bought the former Bainbridge Methodist Chapel to renovate and convert into two affordable and sustainable apartments. They will be let specifically to local people living and working in the remote Upper Dales. Following the discovery and removal of asbestos in 2019, the Chapel has been empty awaiting sale.

The UDCLT was formed in 2017 by a group of concerned Upper Dales residents and local council members. They recognised that there was, and is, a critical shortage of affordable, sustainable housing for people born, living or working in the Upper Dales. This affordable housing shortage is particularly impacting young people and there has been a lot of coverage recently in the regional and national press exploring the issues. The UDCLT wants to do what it can to change this trend in the Upper Dales, so that the unique communities, with their history and legacy, live on. The purchase of Bainbridge Methodist Chapel represents the significant first step on this journey.

And although Bainbridge Methodist Chapel is their first project to get off the ground they have several other housing schemes in the planning stages.

Stephen Stubbs, Chair of the Trust said: "Whilst the Chapel will only provide two new



homes for local people, it is a start and we have other possibilities in the pipeline too. We are very grateful to Richmondshire District Council for supporting us with funds, and to the Methodist Circuit for allowing us to buy the Chapel. We recognise that the hard work is just starting!"

District Council Leader, Councillor Angie Dale, said that providing affordable housing in the rural Upper Dales is a key priority for the authority. "We are pleased to see this project taking off – we have already provided funding in excess of £340,000 and look forward to working with the Trust as the site develops."

Revd. Melanie Reed, Superintendent of the North Yorkshire Dales Methodist Circuit, said "The Circuit Trustees are absolutely thrilled that the Chapel has been purchased by the Trustees of The Upper Dales Community Land Trust and wish them every success as they work towards converting the property into affordable housing, ensuring that the Chapel building remains an important part of the local community."

County Councillor Yvonne Peacock added, "I have a long personal history with the Chapel and am so glad that it will be retained for local people."



The group hope to have the properties ready for occupation in 2023. #### **Heavens Above**

The days get noticeably shorter this month as we head towards the last few weeks of summer. In the night sky the three bright stars of the Summer Triangle still dominate the scene, but they're slowly slipping westwards and by the middle of August autumn's main constellation, Pegasus the Winged Horse, is well on view in the south. Towards the end of the month the beautiful Pleiades star cluster climbs into view by late evening – a sure reminder that the balmy days of summer are coming to an end and that the 'season of mist and mellow fruitfulness' is just around the corner.

There's been a dearth of naked-eye planets in the evening sky for most of this year but things improve this month with Saturn, Jupiter and Mars all rising before midnight. Saturn, the ringed planet reaches opposition on August 14th when it's at its nearest and brightest for the year. It's visible all night long, low in the south amongst the stars of Capricornus. Giant Jupiter, a brilliant object at magnitude minus 2.8, clears the eastern horizon just after 10.00pm. Good binoculars - 10x50 are ideal - will show you its four biggest moons as tiny beads of light strung out on either side of its noticeably flattened disc. Mars, a good deal fainter than Jupiter, rises around 11.30pm amongst the stars of Aries the Ram. It gets brighter and brighter during the coming months almost rivalling Jupiter by the time it reaches opposition on December 1st. Little Mercury, the innermost planet, is lost in the Sun's glare

for the time being but dazzling Venus, rising around **4.00am**, is still on view in the pre-dawn sky. Not for long though. Its gradually sinking into the morning twilight and by the end of September will have disappeared altogether.

It's a shame the Moon spoils our view of this year's Perseids meteor shower. It's one of the best of the annual displays producing dozens of bright shooting stars every hour when it peaks on the night of **August 12th/13th**. Sadly, this coincides with an almost full Moon which means most of the fainter ones will be swamped by strong moonlight. But don't be too disheartened, it's still well worthwhile venturing out to try and catch a glimpse of some of the brighter meteors. You might even spot a really brilliant bolide or fireball streaking across the sky. Best time to look is after midnight from a dark location well away from the street lights.

We're nearly at the end of this year's noctilucent clouds season but you might still catch a display early on in the month. Look out for their eerie silvery-blue filaments glowing softly low in the north-west before midnight or low in the north-east before dawn.

Have clear skies!


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## Westmorland Dales Day

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# Joanne Coates: Daughters of the Soil

#### Tuesday, August 16th – Sunday, September 4th

Women in agriculture will be celebrated in a new photographic exhibition, 'Daughters of the Soil', by award-winning documentary photographer Joanne Coates, at The Garden Rooms, Tennants

This powerful body of work was initially created by Joanne Coates through Maltings Visual Arts in Berwick in partnership with Newcastle University's Centre for Rural Economy and Institute for Creative Arts Practice, focusing on the women of Northumberland. However, the series of portraits has been expanded for this exhibition to focus on telling the stories of women from traditional farming communities in Wensleydale, Swaledale and Coverdale.

Joanne Coates lives and works in the Dales and is deeply connected to the countryside and farming. Having collaborated with Professor Sally Shortall, an expert on gender and




agriculture at Newcastle University, to document the role of women in contemporary farming practices.

Joanne states: "Women's contribution to the farming industry is significant but often overlooked. There are underlying barriers such as access to land, class, motherhood, and lack of clear leadership roles. When tasked with imagining a farmer, who comes to mind? Women make up 15% of the farming industry in the UK, but despite playing a central role in agricultural progress throughout history, documentation of female farmworkers is slim. Over time, the stories of women who have shaped the land have been left unheard."

Joanne uses the medium of photography to explore themes relating to Northern culture and working-class life in rural places, with a strong emphasis on community. She has exhibited both in the UK and internationally and has had commissions for the BBC, The Guardian, The Financial Times, and The Telegraph.

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## Richmondshire Festivals Fund – Money Still Available

Groups still have time to apply for funding to support festivals and events across Richmondshire. The Large Festivals and Events Fund 2022 can help with up to  $\pounds7,000$  in grant aid. It is one of two funds set up by the council to help with celebrations in 2022.

There are grants of up to  $\pounds 5,000$  for a single day event and up to  $\pounds 7,000$  for an event held over two or more consecutive days. It is expected that applications will be received from the organisers of festivals and events which deliver a significant benefit to the local economy through attracting visitors to the district, and which positively promote community engagement and participation.

## Wensleydale School Celebrates Ofsted Result

The Wensleydale School has been graded 'good' by Ofsted maintaining its 'good' result. Inspectors commented on the 'strong leadership', the 'respectful' adult and student relationships, the extra-curricular activities and referenced pupils' 'pride' about their 'tight knit community' and 'inclusive nature of the school.

The school has gone to great lengths to build links with the wider community in Leyburn and the Wensleydale area and inspectors picked up on these charitable and business connections and also added 'the curriculum follows and extends beyond the academic. It ensures pupils have the opportunities to develop into responsible, caring and well-rounded adults'. The report also referenced the large proportion of parents who spoke positively about the school's pastoral care.

The school has undergone an intensive phase of change to ensure all areas of teaching are watertight, create a range of opportunities which extend beyond academic study and bolster morale among staff and parents alike, under a vision shared by all leaders. The Ofsted report specifically acknowledged that 'leaders are unwavering in their commitment to the school community' and that 'parents praised leaders for their support during the pandemic'.

Headteacher Julia Polley, who came to the school before the last inspection, said the 'excellent' result reflects the hardwork of all staff and governors. She said: "I am very pleased with the grading. I've spent the last sixand-a-half years managing change and I'm determined to take the school to the next level over the next five years. I'm extremely proud of staff, governors and all who contribute to our school community."

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The sixth form, which delivers a combined vocational and academic curriculum offering mainly BTECs through the Business and Innovation Centre, was graded as Requires Improvement under 'special circumstances'. With the government's withdrawal of BTECs, it is difficult for the school to offer a curriculum with the sufficient breadth required and inspectors highlighted the Post-16 offering had 'narrowed' and acknowledged this was 'in part due to financial constraints'. This doesn't affect the overall grading of the school.

The Post-16 offering will be suspended for one year, while the school explores its options. The school is committed to its existing Year 12s and will provide them with all they need to successfully complete their course next year. Julia is also proud that all students who have studied at the Business and Innovation Centre over the past four years, have successfully gone on to industry and higher education destinations, having gained hands-on work and mentoring by local businesses, along the way.



#### Prunings

It has been a wonderful year for the roses. On my patio the climbers have won. 'Pink Perpetue' has really lived up to its name – 'Canary Bird' is on its second flush and 'Compassion', which has lived here for more than 40 years has been, and still is, glorious. What is more they all have healthy new growth so they can continue. I was surprised that there did not seem to be many greenfly until one day I caught sight of a spray of buds being picked over by a blue tit. Another eco-friendly justification for spending a fortune on bird feed.

The less looked after areas, my so-called 'wild life project', is full of Ox Eye Daisies, Alchemilla Mollis and Fox and Cubs with the occasional stately spire of Verbascum rising through it. It looks lovely and is a good excuse for leaving well alone.

On the satisfying front we had a super display of white bracts on the Cornus Kousa – or is it 'Norman Hadden'? I can't remember which, but it was expensive at the time and has taken many years to perform. Philadelphus 'Belle Etoile' has huge creamy white flowers with a hint of magenta at the centre, - even better, they smell gorgeous. The Sweet Peas too are now a bonus – in pots on the patio they had a chequered start, bless 'em, they arrived during the snow, but now I need to cut them every couple of days to stop the pods forming and keep them flowering.

We usually have a fair complement of blackbirds, but I have seen many more thrushes than is usual this year. The evidence for me is the copious sprinkling of empty snail shells crunching under my feet as I walk along the yard. Even better, for the first time that I can remember we have been visited by bullfinches. Their brilliant rosy red fronts are unmistakeable. Perhaps the most surprising visitor was the big, fat, grey squirrel strutting his stuff on the raised bed one morning.

If you have Hydrangeas they'll be at the top of their game at this time of year. They are very



easy to grow and as they produce flowers on new growth, they don't need much pruning except to keep them in shape, but can be pruned hard back during winter and early spring. The large mop heads (macrophylla) are the most amazing and if you have room for one Hydrangea, Arborescens Annabelle is probably the most spectacular, but be warned, if it likes its home it will become enormous. Emile Moulliere is another beautiful white type which is not quite as big. They don't particularly like too much heat and will benefit from a situation where they have a little shade from afternoon sun. With not a lot of attention they will come back and reward you every year. Living in the Dales with lots of limestone about, my soil is alkaline and any varieties that claim to be blue gradually turn pink. I have a pretty lace cap specimen called Blue Bird in the corner of a raised bed. Fairly compact and easy to manage it is covered in flowers. Despite its name, they are all pink.

Whatever you grow, take time to enjoy it!



## Yore Club 50 Years

With an element of sadness but also a host of happy memories over the last 50 years, I send out the last report for the Yore Club.

The Yore Club was started in 1968 by the Rev. Malcolm Stonestreet in conjunction with the Red Cross who provided transport to meetings. A committee was formed and with help from the Parish Office in Askrigg who undertook the bookings, meetings commenced once a fortnight. Quite a tall order to have a speaker or afternoon tea trip out or entertainment at each meeting, but done with enthusiasm. In the 1960s an over 60s club was very much needed and well attended, probably 50 plus members with a large number of widows unable to drive therefore destined to be stuck at home. They were joined at some meetings by the Dale End Club from Hawes who in their turn, entertained the Yore Club. The first meetings were held in the school room at Old Yore Bridge, now part of the hotel. Funds for the first 20 years were generated by having a shop at each meeting, basically Bring and Buy. This was followed by donating £1 when you came to a meeting, finally as much as £2.

In January 1969 Wallace Arnold came to show a film entitled 'Plan a Holiday'. After this meeting annual holidays were organised, the first one to Eastbourne. The Dale End Club also joined in and continued through the 1970s and 80s, latterly travelling with Handley's of Middleham. The final holidays were early 2000s when Bibby's of Ingleton took the Yore Club to St Ives, visiting a newly formed Eden Project, and finally a memorable trip to Ballyshannon in Ireland.

Each Christmas Min Tallantire and her team of Red Cross ladies provided a wonderful tea which was followed by home grown entertainment, a pantomime and singing with some great dressing up. I remember how good it was to help with the tea then watch the fun. Dorothy Baker had such a wonderful way of converting the words of well known popular songs into local dialogue and combined with Margaret Wood's piano playing, the scene was set. Robert Readshaw and Gordon Gatwood, Methodist Ministers along with Malcolm Stonestreet, sang and played their part.

Meetings moved around a bit, from Yore Bridge to Station Road Sunday School Room, Askrigg Village Hall, Sycamore Close and latterly Sycamore Hall. Looking back at old programmes, a variety of speakers with some showing slides from many parts of the world and games afternoons along with the occasional meeting when each person took their own favourite reading or poem. In 2004 we reluctantly went from fortnightly meetings to once a month, but it did enable us to continue.

The Yore Club will have visited every local Castle, Abbey and attraction within reach for a day out, along with numerous afternoon tea trips and the regulation shopping trip each year for Christmas. Trips were booked with Ray Sayer of Bellerby for many years followed by Bob Foster of Redmire, who both agreed favourable prices for us. Our favourite driver was Tommy Alderson who never ceased to surprise by turning off down a back road to Bolton Castle or over Hawesend where in reality a 48 seater bus is a little big, the view was fantastic. Once when a little lost and turning round in a gateway, Tommy said "don't worry, all roads lead home" which became a favourite saying.

At the beginning of the covid pandemic and lock down, Anne Deans and I decided that it was a natural time for us to stand down and let someone else take the job on. We had covered between us the last 30 years. Times were changing, less people came to the meetings and it became increasingly difficult to get support for trips. Coach companies were providing their own days away so no one need miss out.

On June 30th 2022, Anne and I went to Sycamore Hall Coffee Morning and handed over our remaining £240 to be used by the Amenity Fund. I know they will carry on for the elderly of the Parish where we left off. Anne was thanked for being in charge for the last 10 plus years with an outside planter.
