

#### **Guest Editorial**

I was asked if I would provide an editorial for the current issue about the changes in the way the filling station in Hawes is run. By the time anyone reads this, the changes will have taken effect and it is a great pleasure to write about it save that the deadline for contributions for the September edition is 24 hours before the key date. Fortunately the risk of it all going wrong is vanishingly small so I don't think I should have refused the request.

My predecessor as chairman of the Upper Dales Community Partnership, the late John Blackie, negotiated a lease for the Partnership to run the filling station approaching five years ago. We are now over half way through our second three year lease. It became clear a few months ago that the present owners had good reasons to sell the site and it seemed almost certain that whoever bought it would want to run it.

The prospect of managing the various businesses within UDCP without generated by the filling station was to say the least daunting. We have little or no income to help us run the library which has been a key service of the partnership since it was founded almost 25 years ago. The financial model for our sort of Post Office branch is designed to be lossmaking. In most cases branches are a modest part of another business and the profits of that are helped by the increase in footfall brought by post office customers. That doesn't apply to us but we are confident that by hosting and running the post office we are providing a vital service for everyone who lives in the Upper Dales and for local businesses. We have only been able to keep going because of the surplus we have been able to generate from the filling station.

In short we had to buy it or lose it. Losing it would mean either the end of the partnership or a much reduced range of services. We had two important strokes of good fortune. First the current owners were deeply familiar with the upper dales and committed to helping the community. Second when the rest of the directors including me were scratching our heads David Colley came up with the model for purchase and ownership which we have adopted. Most readers will have paid attention to our communications and will be aware that David's contribution didn't stop with having a brilliant idea.

We have had two generous grants but the bulk of the money has been provided by individuals who have bought shares in the business in return for an annual dividend of 4% and a discount of 4p per litre on the price of fuel up to a certain amount. We are confident that this model has greatly strengthened the links between the partnership and the well over 200 individuals who are now shareholders.

In order to manage the purchase the work has been done by the partnership and three of the partnership's directors have been the initial directors of the community benefit society. The new organisation will own the site and have directors who are not involved with the partnership. The partnership will continue to run the filling station under the terms of a ten year lease.

The filling station is run on a day to day basis by paid staff and one volunteer whose help is invaluable. It would reduce pressure to have occasional help from other volunteers, for example to cover holidays. If you would like to volunteer please speak to Abbie at the Community Office.

What about the future? Over the winter the partnership hopes to modernise the pumps, improve the surface of the forecourt, increase the number of vehicles that can draw down fuel at the same time and increase the number of card machines. Inevitably we will have to close while that work is done but we hope for no more or not much more than two weeks.

Looking even further ahead we are not the only people in England who don't know that fossil fuels have a limited life. We have begun to think about the implications of that for us and for the upper dales.

I want to end by expressing heartfelt thanks to everyone who has had the confidence to buy into this enterprise which we think is without precedent anywhere in England.

#### **Police Report**

Incidents of note over the last month.

Three bicycles were stolen from a Mountain Biking Event in Grinton one of which was to the value of £7000.

Throughout the reporting period there were eleven road traffic collisions on our roads, ten of which resulted in damage only and 1 resulting in injuries. Unfortunately we are unable to report the outcome or the completion of crimes due to it being too time consuming to open each casefile and research the conclusions.

Whilst searching through some old Newsletter files and books we came across a little book entitled 'Hawes and its Immediate Neighbourhood — An Illustrated Guide for Visitors', published by the Hawes and District Advertising and Improvement Association and priced at 2d. It was printed by T. Hiscock, The Wensleydale Press.

It contains a number of fascinating old photographs and advertisements for Hawes and area hotels and businesses. It is not dated but we guess it is probably well over 100 years old. #### Stepping Up

Stepping up is an early intervention and prevention programme for young people beginning to show signs of engaging in risky behaviour. This may be appearing at school, home or within the local community. Stepping Up draws on a young person's strengths and interests.

There are two strands to Stepping Up and a young person can engage in both or just one dependant on need. The first is that a young person will receive mentoring from one of our mentors. Our mentors will work with a young raise aspiration, to motivation, confidence and look to develop an action plan to support the development of that young person's skills. Initially a young person will have 4 sessions booked in and then from there will determine the next steps. The second element is positive community diversionary activity. By building on the young person's strengths and interest we will support them into local provision within the area they live.

This is an early intervention and prevention project to divert children and young people who have not yet entered the Criminal Justice System but are at risk of doing so. The project is sports based and requires the young person to be willing to take part. It is fully funded, so there is no cost to the young person or their parent. The Stepping Up programme is being run by

#### **Heavens Above**

Jupiter, the Solar System's largest planet, dominates the evening sky this month. You'll find it low in the east after sunset, shining brilliantly amongst the stars of Pisces. By late evening it's well clear of any atmospheric murk and ideally placed for viewing high in the south.



At magnitude minus 2.9 it's much brighter than any star so you won't be able to mistake it for anything else. The giant planet is at its brightest and closest for the year on **September 26th** when it reaches opposition, the date when the Sun, Earth and Jupiter lie in a dead straight line and the planet's face is fully illuminated by the Sun. By then it's visible nearly all night long.

Jupiter is a truly massive world. With a diameter close to 143,000 kilometres it's larger than all the other planets put together. Big enough, in fact, to contain 1300 planets the size of the Earth. Despite its size, however, it takes less than 10 hours to spin round on its axis, faster than any of the other planets, causing it to bulge outwards at the equator. It looks a bit like a squashed satsuma when seen through a small telescope.

Befitting its size, Jupiter has a retinue of 80+ moons though many of them are just a few kilometres across and can't be seen from the Earth. Good 10x50 binoculars, however, will show you the four biggest ones, Io, Ganymede, Europa, and Callisto, as tiny specks of light on either side of the planet's flattened disc. You'll need a reasonably sized telescope, though, to show any details in the bright and dark bands and belts that make up its dense, turbulent atmosphere.

August's Full Moon was the last of this year's four "supermoons", a spectacular sight in the

clear skies we enjoyed during the recent heatwave. This month's Full Moon, on September 10th, is often called the Harvest Moon as it's the closest one to the Autumn Equinox which falls on September 23rd this year. It gets its name because it rises shortly after sunset for several nights in a row, and in the old days, before we had electricity, it provided enough light to enable farmers to carry on working well on into the evening.

The Harvest Moon on a clear summer's night is always a beautiful sight, it's so low down that muck and dust in the atmosphere often turns it a beautiful golden-orange colour, well worth trying to capture if you can get hold of a camera with a decent telephoto lens. Don't bother using your smart phone's camera as the Moon will just look like a tiny bright dot! You'll almost certainly need a tripod as well, as the shutter speeds will be much too long for hand-held shots. Happy snapping!

I would just encourage those of you that are thinking that your baskets and tubs are going over and it's not worth bothering with them, that by constantly dead-heading and regular feeding they really will make a miraculous recovery and go on giving pleasure right into late autumn. A tomato feed concentrate is still the best all round fertilizer diluted in a can of water as per the instructions on the label. Obviously with the hose-pipe ban it should only be by can and very often it can be 'grey water' from washing up and so forth.

I must just mention how well the baskets look in town this year. I feel I'm allowed to say this as you know this is the first year I haven't supplied them.

#### **Prunings**

Sitting under the parasol on the patio when it was cool enough to do so, I have been struck by how much the Weigelia Florida Variegata has grown, rather more than a haircut needed now. addition, there seem to be more stems than usual that are definitely not "variegata". Many variegated shrubs have a tendency to revert back to their original form, and this is what happened. The variegated photosynthesize less well than the plain green leaves, and so if the plain stems were to be left alone the plant would eventually revert back completely. This is not a terminal problem it just means I need to cut out the darker stems when I trim it.

I set about the box hedge with the small cordless trimmer, and my neighbour, walking past must have decided that I was not doing too well. He came back with his own shears and trimmed the lot. How much better it looks. He is a retired professional gardener and has clearly done a great deal of that sort of thing. Thank you so much Stephen, your help is truly appreciated.

Once again, I have been admiring the patch of garden just through the gate at Leyburn Hall. It has had something for every season and everyone can see it and appreciate it. The hellebores in the early spring were brilliant, the hostas burgeoned and then flowered beautifully, and now there are gorgeous hydrangeas of various types and colours and lots of leafy ferns. It really has been a joy, so congratulations and thank you to whoever it was who planned and executed it.

Today (15th) I have picked enough for two vases, and I only had twenty plants. If the threatened thunderstorms come, they will be decimated and I prefer to have them to enjoy. Amazingly I have had a couple of dahlias which managed it through in their last years pots, and although they were late starters they are just opening their first flowers now. Nature can always bring about a surprise.

#### **Notes from Thorney Mire**

#### Summer

What has happened to the swallows and house martins this year? They arrived in May, began nest building as usual under the eaves of the house, both on the back and the front, then disappeared without completing the task. I did find some nesting material and some black and white feathers on the ground so maybe there had been an attack by a larger bird, I don't know. All I know is that for the first time for years we have had no swallows, or house martins rearing their young at Thorney Mire. Apart from February, this year has been very dry, so is it possible the birds couldn't find enough mud to complete their nest building? I have seen four swallows flying around and landing on the wires, but this is nowhere near the number of between twenty to thirty we normally see.

I saw a hare run in the field next to the house, then a few minutes later two stoats ran across the field - they were not chasing the hare. These two stoats were seen in our garden the next day and a solitary deer has appeared in the field by the barn. The greater spotted woodpecker is back again drilling holes into the electricity pole.

We have had two pairs of spotted flycatchers nesting in the garden, one in the front and one in the back. I could see the nest of the one in the front garden as it was at eye level and there were three healthy chicks in it. The parents had done such a good job of rearing them. Unfortunately one morning, I don't know if it had fallen, or been pushed from the nest, as it was a very small nest for three growing birds, sadly one of them was dead on the path.

The other two fledged alright and were really comical. In their fluffed out downy feathers they were twice the size of the adults and they bounced like two brown balls from the front of the garden to the back, while the parents were in the front wondering where they had gone. To add to their parents' work load they decided to play hide and seek. One hid itself in the alpine bed while the second one hid under a fern, cheeping all the time waiting to be fed. I later saw them bouncing across the road on their way to the field and later still a neighbour found one in the middle of the road and one sitting on his doorstep, they were delinquents really. I never saw the ones on the back fledge, the nest was

too high for me to see and I didn't see any brown fluffy balls hopping about the courtyard so I'm assuming they were much better behaved. I blame the parents!

During the first heatwave, everything went quiet, like being in lockdown again. Apart from the occasional farm vehicle, there was no other traffic and no one out walking. One evening, conscious of all the "scary" media health warnings about not going out in the heat, we thought we'd like to go for a walk. Feeling like two naughty school children disobeying the teacher we set off for a stroll along the lane. We were rewarded by seeing a fox run across a distant field and two red squirrels crept up behind us on the top of a wall and chased each other before disappearing at great speed up a tree. A hedgehog joined us for a short time walking by the side of the road, taking advantage of the traffic free lane. Now, I've got to admit that it was hot and a mile and a half was far enough to walk in that heat, but we managed to get home alright without our blood curdling, organs failing, our hair falling out, or any of the other horrors that might have befallen us old dears for being maverick enough to go out against government advice.

I am pleased to report that the ten bird cherry trees which were invaded by the caterpillars in the spring, have all survived. They may not look as good as they should do at this time of year, but they're alive. The caterpillars are probably those of the ermine month which flies at night. Sneaky things you can't see them coming, but I will be watching out for them next year. What I'm going to do with them I haven't yet decided, but I've got a few months to think about it.

My Grandma was a very keen gardener and her organic way of getting rid of caterpillars was to give us, the grandchildren, a jam jar and we were paid one penny for each jar of caterpillars we collected from her cabbages. I don't know what one old pence would be worth in today's money but we had to fill three jars before we had enough to buy a pack of Rowntree's fruit pastilles. I doubt that I will be adopting Grandma's way of getting rid of unwanted pests. I don't know though, with the caterpillars arriving in such vast numbers and the raging inflation today, like Del-Boy and Rodney, this time next year I could be a millionaire!

#### **Newsletter Higher Education Grant**

Once again this Autumn, the Newsletter will be offering a grant of £400 to students living in the Newsletter area (as indicated on the front cover), who are about to commence higher education, following completion of their compulsory education - either the first year of a university course or practical higher education training (eg, HNC, HND, BTEC Level 4 and above, Foundation and Bachelor Degrees). Please note that this grant is only available to those in their **first year of study**.

This grant is not restricted purely to academic studies, but also includes practical courses and learning/instruction in skills which will improve opportunities for employment (such as cookery, hairdressing, beauty etc). In the past, this grant has been used by successful applicants to purchase not only text books but also laptops, sewing machines, cookery knives and beauty kit.

Applicants should apply in writing, or by email, including name, address and contact details. Please give details of the university, college or specialist training facility where studies will take place, together with details of the course/training being followed. If an application is successful, receipts will be required for the purchase of books or equipment and, once these have been received and checked, the grant will be made.

Please forward your application to the Newsletter (see address and email details on the back of the Newsletter), to be received **before** or during the first year of study.

#### **Passenger Surveys**

Passengers on the Sunday 856 DalesBus services (Northallerton-Hawes-Northallerton) are being asked to fill in anonymous questionnaires about their journeys. Information will be used to analyse and assess usage and future demand for the 856 (which is the only through bus service on this route), and to support bids for funding the service after the end of October.

Passengers are reported to have been very willing to help by stating their frequency and reasons for travel and, importantly, whether or not they could make the journey by car if the 856 did not run through the winter.

There are 19 towns and parishes on the 40 mile route (three in Upper Wensleydale: Hawes, Aysgarth and Bainbridge), which is used by regular and occasional users, including many visitors to Hawes and people travelling to Northallerton station and visiting patients in the Friarage.

If you value having this exceptional through bus service to and from Northallerton on Sundays, please tell your local councillors and ask them to support continuation of the 856 service.

Other Sunday DalesBus services coming to or via Upper Wensleydale are the summeronly services 830/831 (Preston-Hawes-Middlesbrough) and 875 (Wetherby-Hawes). The all-year Garsdale station-Hawes service is also paid for by DalesBus on Sundays.
